PTA leaders are here to help you every step of the way in starting a PTA at your school. The process includes:

- Initial inquiry or interest in becoming a PTA is referred to the district PTA that covers the geographical area of the school.
- The district PTA leadership presents general information at a meeting of the school community which includes the principal, staff and parents where questions are answered and consent to move forward is sought.
- 3 Volunteers choose to serve on a steering committee that is responsible for planning and advertising the organization meeting, completing the bylaws and creating a nominating committee that will present a slate of officers to be elected at the organization meeting. Orientation and training will be provided throughout this process so that the new PTA can function effectively as soon as it is organized.
- 4 At the organization meeting, charter members will join, bylaws are adopted and officers will be elected.
- 5 The district organizers will complete and submit various paperwork.
- 6 The district PTA will continue to offer training opportunities and ongoing support for the new PTA during its first year.

Why PTA?

What's in it for schools?

PTAs promote the building of a broad base of parent and community involvement. When parents and community members work as equal partners to improve schools, it is shown that positive results include:

- Upgraded school facilities;
- Improved school leadership and staffing;
- Resources to improve teaching and the curriculum;
- Funding for after-school programs and family supports; and
- Higher-quality learning programs.

What's in it for students?

Thirty years of research prove that students do better when parents are involved. No matter what their income or background, students are more likely to:

- Earn higher grades and test scores;
- Enroll in higher-level programs;
- Be promoted, pass their classes and earn credits;
- Attend school regularly;
- Have better social skills, show improved behavior, and adapt well to school; and
- Graduate and go on to post-secondary education.

- Access to ready-made and easy-to-use programs;
- Involved and informed parents who understand the challenges; that schools face and become part of the solution; and
- A voice to ensure that issues important to the school community are addressed.
